

Out-of-box comparison between Dell, HP, and IBM blade servers

Executive summary

Dell Inc. (Dell) commissioned Principled Technologies (PT) to compare the out-of-box experience of the following three blade systems:

- Dell PowerEdge M600 Blade System
- HP BladeSystem c-Class
- IBM BladeCenter H

We received each chassis and set of blades in the manufacturer's original packaging. We then compared the amount of time it took us to set up each system. Due to differences in packaging and design, there was a considerable difference in setup times for the three systems.

Figures 1A, 1B, and 1C show the components of the three server arrays after we unpacked them. These photographs illustrate the difference in the time and effort required to set up the three blade servers. The Dell blades arrived preconfigured and all necessary components were up and running as soon as we plugged in the enclosure and inserted the blades. HP and IBM shipped the second processor, extra RAM, and hard drives separately; the total of 78 and 62 boxes, respectively, made the unpacking and setup time for the HP and IBM blade servers much longer than that for the Dell blade servers.

KEY FINDINGS

- The 16-blade Dell PowerEdge M600 Blade System took 14 minutes, 13 seconds to assemble; the 16-blade HP BladeSystem c-Class took 3 hours, 13 minutes, 15 seconds to assemble, while the IBM BladeCenter H took 1 hour, 56 minutes, 24 seconds to assemble.
- The Dell PowerEdge M600 Blade System shipped with the blades already assembled and installed in the enclosure; the HP BladeSystem c-Class and IBM BladeCenter H chassis arrived unassembled and required us to install a processor, memory, and hard disk in each blade.
- The Dell PowerEdge M600 Blade System arrived in one box, the HP BladeSystem c-Class arrived in 78 boxes, and the IBM arrived in 62 boxes.

Figure 2 summarizes the amount of time we spent unpacking each system and installing it in the server rack. Compared to the process for the Dell system, the process for the HP system took more than 12 times as long and the process for the IBM system took more than seven times as long.

Test results

In this section, we detail our experience setting up the Dell PowerEdge M600 Blade System, HP BladeSystem c-Class enclosures, and IBM BladeCenter H chassis, from the time each system arrived through our installation of all of its blades in the chassis and the chassis in a server rack. We discuss this process in the following stages:

- Receiving the system
- Removing system components from their packaging
 - Opening and removing parts from shipping boxes
 - Removing components and server from outer shipping box
 - Removing plastic wrap and foam pieces from server
 - Removing chassis from pallet
- Installing the system in the server rack
 - Installing rails and mounting chassis into server rack
 - Installing blades into chassis

For each stage and sub-stage after we received the systems, we enumerate the steps we executed, note the amount of time (hours:minutes:seconds) each step took, and provide representative photographs.

Receiving the system

Dell

As Figure 3A shows, the Dell shipment consisted of one large box strapped to a pallet.

The shipping service delivered the box to our second-floor lab.

HP

As Figure 3B shows, the HP shipment consisted of 78 boxes. Upon arrival at our building, the large box was strapped to a pallet and the 77 smaller boxes were attached to a large pallet with plastic wrap.

Because the large pallet could not fit into the elevator to our second-floor lab, we had to unwrap the pallet in the lobby and make multiple elevator trips to bring the smaller boxes up to our lab. (Note: We did not time the process of transporting the 77 smaller boxes.)

IBM

The IBM shipment consisted of one large box on a pallet and 3 smaller boxes, which were not on a pallet.

The smaller boxes contained additional boxes inside. After unpacking these boxes, we had counted 62 total boxes for the IBM installation. Figure 3C shows these 62 boxes.

Removing the system components from their packaging

Opening and removing parts from shipping boxes

Dell

1. Cut off the straps, and then cut through the tape to open the top of the box. (00:00:22)

Total time: 22 seconds

HP

1. Opened the hard disk boxes and placed them on the table. (00:17:00)
2. Opened the blade server boxes and placed the blade servers on the table. (00:10:30)
3. Opened the blade kit boxes and placed the processors and heat sinks on the table. (00:15:00)
4. Opened the RAM box and placed the RAM on the table. (00:01:45)
5. Opened the Ethernet switch box and placed the switch on the table. (00:02:00)
6. Opened the fan boxes and placed the fans on the table. (00:06:00)
7. Opened the PDU boxes and placed items on the table. (00:03:00)
8. Cut off the straps, and then cut through the tape to open the top of the box. (00:00:30)

Total time: 55 minutes, 45 seconds

IBM

1. Opened the hard disk boxes and placed them on the table. (00:13:10)
2. Opened the processor boxes and placed the processors and heat sinks on the table. (00:13:35)
3. Opened the IBM BladeCenter Copper Pass-thru Module boxes and placed the modules and cables on the table. (00:02:35)
4. Opened the IBM BladeCenter blade server boxes and placed the blade servers on the table. (00:12:27)
5. Opened the 2900W AC power module box and placed the modules on the table. (00:01:02)
6. Removed the white box locks from the bottom of the box. (00:00:45)
7. Read the outside of the box to determine unpacking steps. (00:00:30)
8. Cut off the straps, and then cut through the tape to open the top of the box. (00:00:22)

Total time: 44 minutes, 26 seconds

Removing components and server from outer shipping box

Dell

1. Removed the topmost box and set it aside. (00:00:12)
2. Removed the outermost cardboard covering. (00:00:08)

Total time: 20 seconds

HP

1. Removed the topmost boxes and the template for inserting the enclosure onto the rack and set them aside. (00:01:15)
2. Removed the foam padding from the top of the server. (00:00:30)
3. Removed the outermost cardboard covering. (00:00:30)

Total time: 2 minutes, 15 seconds

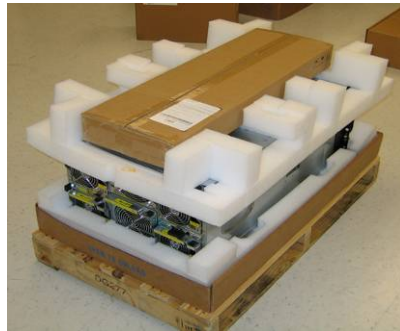


Figure 5B: The HP server with outer cardboard covering removed.

IBM

1. Removed the topmost cardboard inserts and the direction pack and set them aside. (00:00:15)
2. Read instructions and user guide to look for quick start guide (finding none). (00:00:45)
3. Removed the outermost cardboard covering. (00:00:09)

Total time: 1 minute, 9 seconds

Removing plastic wrap and foam pieces from server

Dell

1. Removed and opened the second box and set it aside. (00:00:18)
2. Removed the foam pieces from the Dell blade system. (00:00:57)

Total time: 1 minute, 15 seconds

HP

1. Removed the corner pieces and set them aside. (00:00:15)
2. Removed the plastic wrap around the server. (00:00:30)

Total time: 45 seconds

IBM

1. Removed the foam corner pieces and set them aside. (00:00:15)
2. Removed the box of rack rails and set them aside. (00:00:04)
3. Removed the plastic wrap strap around the base of the server. (00:00:06)
4. Removed the cardboard insert (it had a 3 on it) from the end of server. (00:00:04)
5. Opened the top pieces of foam from the server bottom and set them aside. (00:00:14)
6. Removed the plastic wrap from around the server. (00:00:30)

Total time: 1 minute, 13 seconds

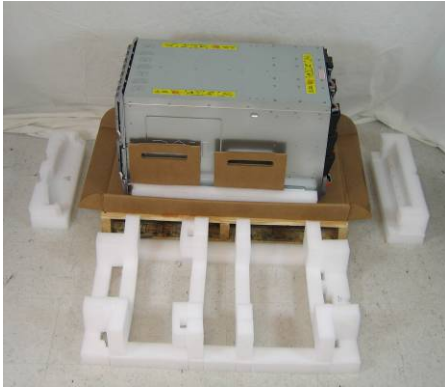


Figure 6A: The Dell server with foam pieces removed.

Removing chassis from pallet

Dell

1. Removed the blades and set them onto a table. (00:02:44)
(Note: Step no. 2 on the server chassis mentions the use of anti-static sheets. These sheets did not arrive with the server.)
2. Removed the power supplies. (00:01:32)
3. Lifted the chassis off the pallet. (00:00:09)

Total time: 4 minutes, 25 seconds

HP

1. Lifted the chassis from the pallet. (00:02:00)

Total time: 2 minutes, 0 seconds

IBM

1. Read the yellow instruction tabs on the top of the enclosure. (00:00:10)
2. Removed all items from the front of the enclosure to lessen the weight as per the yellow instructions and set the items to the side. (00:02:09)
3. Removed the two fan assemblies from the back of the enclosure to lessen the weight as per the yellow instructions and set the items to the side. (00:00:17)
4. Lifted the chassis from the pallet. (00:00:18)

Total time: 2 minutes, 54 seconds

Installing the system in the server rack

Installing rails and mounting the chassis in the server rack

Dell

Note: We followed the Getting Started with your System guide to install the chassis in the rack.

1. Open and unpack the rails box and read the instructions. (00:00:48)

Note: We followed the instructions on the template that was in the chassis box.

1. Removed the template and placed it on the rack. (00:01:00)
2. Opened the power supply boxes and placed the power supplies on the table. (00:06:00)

IBM

Note: We followed the instructions on the rack template and BladeCenter H Rack Installation Guide.

1. Opened the rail box (00:00:05)
2. Removed the rail parts from the box. (00:00:28)
3. Removed the rail parts from the plastic bags. (00:00:36)
4. Examined the rack template

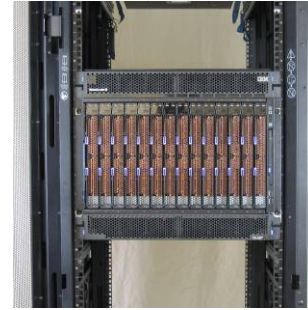


Figure 8C: The IBM blades and power supplies installed in the chassis. (Power supplies in back are not visible.)

Test methodology

We attempted to recreate the way a typical buyer would set up a chassis of blade servers. We generally followed the instructions the vendors provided in their packaging. Occasionally, such as when we were opening the boxes, we had to use our own judgment, but whenever possible, we followed the vendors' instructions.

As one person executed the tasks, another person documented the process by recording the steps, timing each step, and photographing as many steps as reasonably possible.
