

Technologies® FEDRUART 20 Comparison of operating system deployment preparation with Microsoft System Center Configuration Manager 2007: Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration vs. HP PXE deployment processes

Executive Summary

Principled

Dell Inc. (Dell) commissioned Principled Technologies (PT) to compare operating system (OS) deployment workflows using Microsoft[®] System Center Configuration Manager 2007 (ConfigMgr) with the following solutions:

- ConfigMgr with the Dell[™] Server Deployment Pack (DSDP) and the Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration for Configuration Manager tool
- ConfigMgr with the HP OS Deployment Pack using Preboot Execution Environment (PXE)

This report focuses on the simplicity of use and the time benefits of Dell's Lifecycle Controller–based remote deployment and discovery procedures with ConfigMgr versus the HP manual import process with ConfigMgr using PXE.

Microsoft System Center Configuration Manager 2007 is a robust systems management solution for medium to large enterprises that allows for multiple capabilities, including the important task of operating system deployment. Using ConfigMgr 2007, businesses and organizations can deploy Windows operating systems in an automated manner,

KEY FINDINGS

- Using the Dell Server Deployment Pack and Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration for ConfigMgr, the hands-on time required by an IT Administrator to remotely discover systems on the network is demonstrably reduced to a negligible level due to the auto-discover functionality embedded in Dell's 11G PowerEdge servers. (See Figure 1.)
- The Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration for Microsoft[®] System Center Configuration Manager 2007 (ConfigMgr) combined with the Dell Server Deployment Pack eliminates the need for a Preboot Execution Environment (PXE)-based provisioning network.¹ Utilizing the Dell deployment process with System Center Configuration Manager, IT administrators can securely and remotely install servers on existing production networks, saving time, resources, and associated operational expenses.
- The total server deployment preparation time, comprised of both machine wait time and hands-on time, to discover and import blade servers in the ConfigMgr 2007 environment is up to 60% faster when using the PXE-less automated process enabled by Dell Lifecycle Controller than when using the manual import process required for HP blades in ConfigMgr 2007 environments. Server manufacturers, in this case Dell and HP, have developed specialized tools for ConfigMgr 2007 to further enhance and automate each vendor's server OS installation process.

Taking automation and removal of human error even further, however, Dell has released Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration for ConfigMgr, which automates server discovery and provides a view of the onboard repository of drivers embedded in Dell's hardware platform.

After installation and configuration of the Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration for ConfigMgr tool combined with the Dell Server Deployment Pack, the Dell deployment solution provided automated discovery of hardware with no intervention from our technical staff. The HP OS Deployment Pack for System Center Configuration Manager provided little in the way of automating the import or discovery of new machines, and required manual intervention by technical staff to import the machines and prepare for deployment. Figure 1 shows the number of steps involved in the discovery and import (Dell) compared to the import (HP) of the target machines in a typical installation. In preparing for server OS deployment, the discovery and import of servers when using the Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration for ConfigMgr tool combined with the Dell Server Deployment Pack is an automated, two-step process compared to the more manual seven-step discovery and import process employed when utilizing the HP OS Deployment Pack for System Center Configuration Manager.²

Testing Overview

In this testing scenario, we set up two deployment environments powered by Microsoft ConfigMgr: one for Dell using an auto-discovery and deployment method without PXE and one for HP using a traditional manual import and PXE-based deployment method. The Dell scenario did not require a PXE service point installed in ConfigMgr because the Dell's 11th generation PowerEdge servers include the auto-discover feature and integrate closely with ConfigMgr, communicating directly with provisioned systems via a web service as opposed to using the PXE protocol. In both the HP PXE-based scenario and the Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration scenario, we measured both machine wait time and hands-on IT administrator time to setup each environment and to discover or import machines for operating system deployment.

We tested both rack servers and blade servers for both the Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration for ConfigMgr solution and the HP PXE-based solution. The rack servers we tested were the Dell PowerEdge R710 and the HP ProLiant DL380 G6. The blade servers we tested were the Dell PowerEdge M610 and the HP ProLiant BL460c G6. For more details on the complete test bed setup, refer to the Test Bed Setup section on Page 4.

We used Microsoft System Center Configuration Manager 2007 SP1 for both the Dell and HP deployment scenarios. We used version 1.0 of the Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration tool for ConfigMgr.

Advantages of Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration

In the overall bare-metal server and OS deployment process, Dell has distinct advantages with the integration of Lifecycle Controller features with Microsoft System Center Configuration Manager. The Dell deployment solution for ConfigMgr saves setup and discovery time. It also eliminates complexity and potential for human error by autodiscovering newly provisioned machines and by leveraging the Dell PowerEdge 11G servers' embedded driver repository. Also, in contrast to the HP PXE-based deployment solution, the Dell deployment solution for ConfigMgr is more secure and allows IT administrators to deploy servers directly on a production network, instead of using a detached provisioning network.

• **Time savings.** The auto-discovery feature of the Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration for ConfigMgr saves time for system administrators and data center operators. In our lab testing, the Dell Server Deployment Pack and Lifecycle Controller discovery and import process was up to 53 percent faster overall on the Dell PowerEdge R710 than was the import process with the HP OS Deployment Pack with PXE scenario

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on the HP ProLiant DL380 G6.³ The Dell Deployment Pack and Lifecycle Controller discovery and import process was up to 60 percent faster overall on the Dell PowerEdge M610 blade servers than was the import process with the HP OS Deployment Pack with PXE scenario on the HP ProLiant BL460C G6 blade servers.⁴ This includes both employee hands-on time and machine wait time. Figure 2 shows the detailed time results for each system.

- Automation. With the reduction of steps necessary for discovery and import reduced to simply plugging the server in, the Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration for ConfigMgr tool saves IT administrators' time and reduces complexity, which compounds over time as you install more servers. (See Figure 3.) With the HP PXE-based solution, several steps remain necessary for the import of each machine, resulting in greater potential for human error and more time consumed by IT staff. In contrast, with the Dell solution, simply plug in your servers; no further hands-on time is required.
- **Simplicity.** Dell Lifecycle Controller for ConfigMgr reduces the complexity of IT maintenance tasks. After the initial configuration of the environment, the only task to be performed is cabling the rack server into the network infrastructure or simply inserting the blade. The autodiscover process then automatically injects the server information in the

System Center Configuration Manager console, where the IT administrator can then schedule deployments. This contrasts with the HP PXE-based configuration, where the data center technician must, at a minimum, ensure that the BIOS boot order is set to boot to PXE, record the MAC address, and communicate the MAC address to the ConfigMgr administrator. The ConfigMgr administrator must then manually import the machine to System Center Configuration Manager. (See Figure 1.)

• **Reduction in potential for human error.** Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration for ConfigMgr exposes and leverages multiple operating systems' drivers that reside directly onboard the specified target Dell 11G PowerEdge Server. This ensures that, as a part of the operating system deployment process, the driver installations that occur are less prone to error because Dell has validated and tested these embedded drivers at the factory.

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- Security. By default, Dell 11G servers include the Lifecycle Controller and ship with a factory-issued client certificate for security. This ensures that the operating system deployment is secure from the time the servers arrive. Customers can import lists of specific service tags to ensure accuracy in installing only targeted servers or can disable the Lifecycle Controller features if necessary during the configuration of System Center Configuration Manager.
- **Cost savings.** The auto-discovery features of Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration for ConfigMgr on Dell 11G servers eliminate the need for a PXE environment, which is advantageous for a number of reasons:
 - PXE security issues. Because of PXE-related security risks, PXE environments are often implemented in a detached network staging area, requiring extra hardware and IT resources. The Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration for ConfigMgr tool enables deployment directly on the production network, removing the PXE service point as a dependency and the need for additional IT resources.
 - Reduction in maintenance, backups, and power usage. Like any other utility server, machines used for utility functions such as PXE add to overall server count, power consumption, and backup needs. Full time employee (FTE) cost, backup time and capacity, and power consumption are all directly correlated to the number of servers in the environment. Each server removed from the environment reduces operational expenses and saves money for the organization.

Test Bed Setup

We set up two parallel test beds for each of our ConfigMgr scenarios: one using the Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration for ConfigMgr tool (Dell), and one using the PXE service point functionality in ConfigMgr (HP). Below, we describe each test bed and the general steps we followed to prepare each test bed for the discovery and import process. Figure 4 shows the diagram of the test servers we used for the Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration-based process with ConfigMgr and Figure 5 shows the diagram of the test servers we used for the HP PXE-based process with ConfigMgr.

In the Dell test bed, we used two Dell PowerEdge R510 servers, one for Active Directory and DCHP services, and one for System Center Configuration Manager 2007. For target deployment servers, we used four Dell

PowerEdge M610 blade servers and one Dell PowerEdge R710 server. We used a Dell PowerConnect 5448 1Gb Ethernet switch for connecting this test bed. For the Dell Lifecycle Controller-based configuration, we performed the following setup tasks. See the Test Methodology section for more specific details.

- 1. Installed Windows Server 2008 x64 on a Dell PowerEdge R510 and promoted it to be a primary domain controller.
- 2. Enabled the DHCP role on the domain controller server.
- 3. Installed Windows Server 2008 x64 and SQL Server 2008 on a separate Dell PowerEdge R510 to act as our ConfigMgr server.
- Configured the Dell PowerEdge R510 for ConfigMgr as specified by Microsoft documentation.⁶
- Installed System Center Configuration Manager2007 SP1 on the Dell PowerEdge R510 designated for ConfigMgr.
- 6. Installed the Dell Server Deployment Pack version 1.1 for ConfigMgr.
- 7. Installed the Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration

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for ConfigMgr version 1.0 for ConfigMgr.

- Imported the specific servers' driver sets from a Dell Systems DVD. Although we used the drivers onboard the Dell Lifecycle Controller, these drivers are still required in the task sequence configuration for the purposes of backup and failover.
- 9. Managed and updated all software packages and boot images to the distribution point in ConfigMgr.
- 10. Installed and captured a reference machine, for both the Dell PowerEdge M610 and Dell PowerEdge R710 deployments.
- 11. Added a vendor scope option to the DHCP server, which in our case was the domain controller.
- 12. Verified auto-discovery settings on the iDRAC of the target machines.

In the HP test bed, we used two HP ProLiant DL180 servers, one for Active Directory and DCHP services, and one for ConfigMgr. For target deployment servers, we used four HP ProLiant BL460c G6 blade servers and one HP ProLiant DL380 G6 server. We used a Dell PowerConnect 5448 1Gb Ethernet switch for connecting this test bed. For the HP PXE-based System Center Configuration Manager configuration, we performed the following setup tasks. See the Test methodology section for more specific details.

- Installed Windows Server 2008 x64 on an HP ProLiant DL180, and promoted it to be a primary domain controller.
- 2. Enabled the DHCP role on the domain controller server.
- 3. Installed Windows Server 2008 x64 and SQL Server 2008 on a separate HP ProLiant DL180 to act as our ConfigMgr server.
- Configured the HP ProLiant DL180 for ConfigMgr as specified by Microsoft documentation.⁷
- Installed System Center Configuration Manager 2007 SP1 on the HP ProLiant DL180 designated for ConfigMgr.
- Installed Windows Deployment Services on the ConfigMgr server, as required by the PXE Service point.
- 7. Installed the PXE Service point role in ConfigMgr.
- 8. Installed the HP Operating System Deployment Pack for ConfigMgr.
- 9. Managed and updated all software packages and boot images to the distribution point in ConfigMgr.
- Installed and captured a reference machine, for both the HP ProLiant BL460c G6 and HP ProLiant DL380 G6 deployments.

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Test Methodology

Because portions of the two test bed setups were identical, we followed similar steps where possible. Where steps differ, we note this in the header of each section with (Dell only) or (HP only). We also note below the sections that we timed specifically for this report.

Installing Windows Server 2008 x64 with SP2 on the domain controller servers and the ConfigMgr servers (both Dell and HP)

- 1. Insert the installation DVD for Windows Server 2008 x64 with SP2 into the DVD drive.
- 2. Select the language, time and currency, and keyboard input. Click Next.
- 3. Click Install Now.
- 4. Select Windows Server Enterprise (Full Installation), and click Next.
- 5. Accept the license terms, and click Next.
- 6. Click Custom.
- 7. Click the Disk, and click Drive options (advanced).
- 8. Click New, Apply, Format, and click Next.
- 9. Let the installation process continue. The server will reboot several times.
- 10. After the installation completes, click OK to set the Administrator password.
- 11. Enter the administrator password twice, and click OK.
- 12. Click Start, Control Panel, and double-click System.
- 13. Click Change Settings.
- 14. Click Change.
- 15. Enter the new computer name, and click OK.
- 16. Click OK to restart, click Close, and click Restart Now.
- 17. Repeat steps 1 through 16 for the remaining Dell PowerEdge and HP ProLiant servers.

Installing Windows updates on the domain controller servers and the ConfigMgr servers (both Dell and HP)

- 1. Click Start, Windows Update.
- 2. Click View Advanced Options.
- 3. Click Check for Updates.
- 4. When the application prompts you to install an update for Windows Update, click Install Now.
- 5. Click View available updates to ensure you install the necessary updates.
- 6. Click Install.
- 7. Agree to the license terms, and click Finish.
- 8. Reboot the server when the application requests you do so.
- 9. After reboot, check Windows Update again for further updates.
- 10. Repeat steps 3 through 9 until no further updates appear.
- 11. If Windows lists no important updates, close the updates window.
- 12. Repeat steps 1 through 11 for the remaining Dell PowerEdge and HP ProLiant servers.

Installing Active Directory on the domain controller (both Dell and HP)

- 1. On the relevant Dell PowerEdge R510 and HP ProLiant DL180, set a static IP address:
 - a. Right-click the network icon in the quick-launch bar, and select Network and Sharing Center.
 - b. Click Manage network connections.
 - c. Right-click the local area connection, and select Properties.
 - d. Select Internet Protocol Version (TCP/IPv4), and click Properties.
 - e. Select the Use the following IP address radio button, and type 192.168.10.10 in the IP address field.
 - f. Press Tab to auto-fill 255.255.255.0 in the Subnet mask field.
 - g. In the Preferred DNS server field, type 127.0.0.1 and click OK to close the IPv4 properties window.
 - h. Click OK, and close.
- 2. Promote the server to domain controller:
 - a. Select Start→Command Prompt.

- b. Type dcpromo, and press Enter.
- c. Click Next.
- d. Click Next.
- e. Select Create a new domain forest, and click Next.
- f. Type <domainname> as the FQDN (Fully Qualified Domain Name), and click Next.
- g. Set the forest functional level to Windows Server 2003, and click Next.
- h. Set the domain functional level to Windows Server 2003, and click Next.
- i. Leave defaults on the Additional Domain Controller Options screen, and click Next.
- j. If a warning window appears asking about dynamically assigned IP addresses, click Yes.
- k. Click Yes to Continue.
- I. Leave defaults at the Location for Database, Log Files, and SYSVOL screen. Click Next.
- m. At the Directory Services Restore Mode Administrator Password screen, type Password1.
- n. At the summary screen, click Next.
- o. Click Finish.
- p. Click Restart now.

Configuring DHCP on the Active Directory server (both Dell and HP)

1. Click Start, Administrative Tools, Server Manager.

- 2. Click Roles.
- 3. Click Add Roles.
- 4. Click Next.
- 5. Select DHCP, and click Next.
- 6. Click Next.
- 7. Accept the default network connection for DHCP, and click Next.
- 8. Accept the default DNS settings, and click Next.
- 9. At the WINs screen, click Next.
- 10. At the scope screen, click Add.
- 11. Provide a scope name, starting IP, ending IP, subnet, and gateway (optional).
- 12. Leave the activate checkbox checked, and click OK.
- 13. Click Next.
- 14. At the DHCP stateless mode screen, choose to disable DHCPv6, and click Next.
- 15. Choose to use current credentials, and click Next.
- 16. Click Install.

Installing and configuring IIS on the ConfigMgr server (both Dell and HP)

- 1. On the ConfigMgr server, navigate to Start→All Programs→Administrative Tools→Server Manager to start Server Manager.
- 2. At the Select Features page of the Add Features Wizard, select BITS Server Extensions.
- 3. When the application prompts you to do so, click Add Required Role Services to add the dependent components, including the Web Server (IIS) role.
- 4. Select Remote Differential Compression, and click Next.
- 5. At the Web Server (IIS) page of the Add Features Wizard, click Next.
- At the Select Role Services page of the Add Features Wizard, under Application Development, select ASP.NET and, when the application prompts you to do so, click Add Required Role Services to add the dependent components.
- 7. Under Security, select Windows Authentication.
- 8. In the Management Tools node, under IIS 6 Management Compatibility, ensure that both IIS 6 Metabase Compatibility and IIS 6 WMI Compatibility are selected, and click Next.
- 9. At the Confirmation page, click Install, and complete the rest of the wizard.
- 10. Click Close to exit the Add Features Wizard, and close Server Manager.

Installing and configuring WebDAV on the ConfigMgr server (both Dell and HP)

- 1. Run the WebDAV installation executable (available from http://go.microsoft.com/fwlink/?LinkId=108052).
- 2. Enable WebDAV, and create an Authoring Rule:

- a. Navigate to Start→All Programs→Administrative Tools→Internet Information Services (IIS) Manager to start Internet Information Services 7 Application Server Manager.
- b. In the Connections pane, expand the Sites node in the navigation tree, and click Default Web Site if you are using the default Web site for the site system or SMSWEB if you are using a custom Web site for the site system.
- c. In the Features View, double-click WebDAV Authoring Rules.
- d. When the WebDAV Authoring Rules page appears, in the Actions pane, click Enable WebDAV.
- e. After WebDAV has been enabled, in the Actions pane, click Add Authoring Rule.
- f. In the Add Authoring Rule dialog box, under Allow access to, click All content.
- g. Under Allow access to this content to, click All users.
- h. Under Permissions, click Read, and click OK.
- 3. Change the property behavior:
 - a. In the WebDAV Authoring Rules page, in the Actions pane, click WebDAV Settings.
 - b. In the WebDAV Settings page, under Property Behavior, set Allow anonymous property queries to True.
 - c. Set Allow Custom Properties to False.
 - d. Set Allow property queries with infinite depth to True.
 - e. If this is a BITS-enabled distribution point, under WebDAV Behavior, set Allow hidden files to be listed to True.
 - f. In the Action pane, click Apply.
 - g. Close Internet Information Services (IIS) Manager.

Joining the Active Directory Domain on the ConfigMgr server (both Dell and HP)

- 1. On the ConfigMgr server, click Start, Control Panel.
- 2. Double-click Network and Sharing Center.
- 3. Click Manage network connections.
- 4. Right-click the relevant connection, and select Properties.
- 5. Click Internet Protocol Version 4 (TCP/IPv4), and click Properties.
- 6. Click Use the following IP address, and enter a valid IP address for the domain.
- 7. Enter a valid subnet mask.
- 8. Click Use the following DNS server addresses, and enter the domain controller IP address.
- 9. Click OK, and click Close.
- 10. Close the Network Connections window.
- 11. Click Start→Control Panel.
- 12. Double-click System.
- 13. Click Change Settings.
- 14. Click Change.
- 15. Click Member of Domain.
- 16. Type the domain name, and click OK.
- 17. Enter the username and password of the domain administrator, and click OK.
- 18. Click OK on the Welcome to the domain dialog box.
- 19. Click OK twice.
- 20. Reboot the computer.

Installing Windows Server Updates Services 3.0 SP2 on the ConfigMgr server (both Dell and HP)

- 1. Click Start→All Programs→Administrative Tools→Server Manager to start Server Manager.
- 2. Click Add Roles in the right pane of the Server Manager, and click Next.
- 3. At the Select Roles page, select Windows Server Update Services.
- 4. When the application prompts you to do so, click Add Required Role Services to add the dependent components, and click Next.
- 5. At the Introduction to Web Server (IIS) page, click Next.
- 6. At the Select Role Services page, click Next.
- 7. At the Windows Server Updates Services page, click Next.
- 8. At the Confirm Installation Selections page, click Install.
- 9. When the WSUS 3.0 SP2 setup Wizard starts, click Next.

- 10. At the License Agreement screen, click the I accept radio button, and click Next.
- 11. If you see a warning about a required component, click Next.
- 12. At the Select Update Source page, click Next.
- 13. At the Database Options page, click Next.
- 14. At the Web Site Selection page, click Next.
- 15. At the Ready to Install page, click Next.
- 16. At the Completing the Windows Server Update services screen, click Finish.
- 17. At the Before you Begin screen, click Next.
- 18. At the Microsoft Update Improvement Program, uncheck the Yes box, and click Next.
- 19. At the Choose Upstream Server screen, click Next.
- 20. At the Specify Proxy Server, click Next.
- 21. At the Connect to Upstream Server screen, select Start Connecting.
- 22. Skip to the next page in the wizard, and complete the steps in the wizard that begin on the To Continue installing WSUS 3.0 SP2 page.

Configuring Active Directory credentials for SQL Server and the ConfigMgr Network Access account on the domain controller (both Dell and HP)

- 1. On the Active Directory server, click Start→Administrative Tools→Active Directory Users and Computers.
- 2. Expand the domain, right-click users, and click New user.
- 3. Enter a username and password for the SQL Service account, uncheck the user must change password at next login box, and ensure the password is not set to expire.
- 4. Repeat steps 2 and 3 for the ConfigMgr Network Access Account.
- 5. To configure a service principal name for SQL Server, follow these steps:
 - a. Click Start, click Run, and type cmd to enter a command prompt.
 - b. Enter the following command to set the service principal name for SQL Server: setspn -A MSSQLSvc/ConfigMgrserver:1433 domainname\serviceaccount
- 6. To configure the permissions for the Network Access Account for ConfigMgr, follow these steps:
 - a. On the ConfigMgr server, click Start \rightarrow Administrative Tools \rightarrow Computer Management.
 - b. Click Local Users and Groups, and click Groups.
 - c. Double-click Administrators.

- 7. Communicate the MAC address via email to the system administrator for ConfigMgr.

Importing the machine to the new collection (HP only).

Note: We timed both hands-on IT staff time and machine wait time in this section for reporting purposes.

- 1. In the Configuration Manager console, navigate to System Center Configuration Manager→Site Database→Computer Management→Operating System Deployment→Computer Association.
- 2. Right-click Computer Association.
- 3. Select Import Computer Information.
- 4. At the Select Source screen, select Import single computer, and click Next.
- 5. At the Single Computer screen, provide a computer name, enter the MAC address associated with the target system, and click Next.

- 6. At the Data Preview screen, click Next.
- 7. At the Choose Target Collection screen, select Add computers to the following collection, and click Browse.
- 8. Select the appropriate collection, and click OK.
- 9. Click Next.
- 10. At the Summary screen, click Next.
- 11. Click Close.

Auto-discovering the server in the Dell Environment (Dell only).¹⁰

Note: We timed both hands-on IT staff time and machine wait time in this section for reporting purposes.

- 1. For the blade server, insert the blade into the blade chassis. For the rack server, plug in the network cable.
- 2. In the ConfigMgr console, browse to collections and refresh approximately every 30 seconds.

Deploying the OS via PXE (HP only)

After you import the system in the HP scenario, you create a task sequence, advertise the task sequence to the relevant collection, and manually reboot the target deployment server to PXE boot.

Deploying the OS via Dell Lifecycle Controller Integration (Dell only)

After the system is auto-discovered in the Dell scenario, you create a task sequence, advertise the task sequence to the relevant collection, create a WinPE ISO image to store on the network, launch the Dell Lifecycle Controller Config utility, and reboot the targeted collection.
